Welcome

Dear Colleagues,

On behalf of the 2024 Conference Planning
Committee, it is my great honor and pleasure to
welcome you to Minnesota! We like to call our
state the Land of 10,000 Lakes, and also the land
of 10,000 choirs — and we are thrilled to share a
small taste of both with all of you this summer! We
will hear four of those many choirs: The Singers; Kantorei; the Choir of
Saint John the Evangelist Episcopal Church; and a festival choir drawn
from parishes within the Diocese of Minnesota.

Mni Sóta Makoce, the Dakota phrase from which the name for our state is derived, has been poetically translated as "the land where the waters reflect the sky". Our opening Eucharist at Saint Mark's Cathedral will celebrate the Episcopal Church's first Indigenous priest, Enmegahbowh. Our preacher, and later our keynote speaker, the Venerable Paul Sneve, Archdeacon of South Dakota and a member of the Rosebud Sioux, will talk about the deep interconnection between Indigenous people and the foundation of the Episcopal Church in the upper Midwest.

We will hear from a panel of women composers, and then sing the music and words of women composers and poets in a hymn festival led by Cantor David Cherwien at the storied Mount Olive Lutheran Church in Minneapolis. Minnesota's first bishop, The Right Reverend Henry Benjamin Whipple, was an early leader in ecumenism, and worked closely with Swedish Lutheran congregations. Today we share full communion with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, which has a significant presence and influence in Minnesota, so we will attend a Vespers service at Gloria Dei Lutheran Church in Saint Paul.

Our final full day together will take us to the Benedictine monastery of Saint John's Abbey, which provides us our theme of "Walking with Saint Benedict". We will be immersed in the numinous landscape; hear the glorious and recently expanded Abbey Church organ played by TWO great organists — Isabelle Demers and Damin Spritzer; and have the opportunity to join the monastic community in their daily rhythm of prayer. Those who choose the retreat-track will stay overnight at the Abbey Guest House and be immersed even more deeply into the monastic rhythm of prayer. For those returning to the Twin Cities, the closing Eucharist will be held at Saint John the Evangelist Episcopal Church in Saint Paul.

The entire Committee and I look forward to meeting you in person — welcome!

The Singers – Minnesota Choral Artists have shared their inspiring artistry and community impacts through remarkable performances for twenty years. Audiences have come to recognize their peerless singing, vocal flexibility between musical styles, their commitment to ensemble singing, and their willingness to sing music that speaks to a changing world.

Proud standard-bearers of the Midwest choral tradition, The Singers are as comfortable singing Bach as they are Bob Dylan. The choir, under the artistic leadership of its founder Matthew Culloton, have performed four times at the famed Ravinia Festival (the summer home of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra), Orchestra Hall in Minneapolis, Ordway Performance Center in St. Paul, Chicago's Orchestra Hall, and churches, auditoriums, and schools across the Midwest. The Singers frequently collaborate with the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, where they have performed under conductors Jonathan Cohen, Jeannette Sorrell, Jory Vinikour, and Paul McCreesh. The choir has been honored to sing under other leading conductors including Craig Hella Johnson, René Clausen, and Kathy Romey.

The Singers' discography includes their latest collection, *Come to the Woods*, which features works by American composers Jake Runestad, Moira Smiley, Dominick Argento, Samuel Barber,

and John Corigliano. Lauridsen: *Mid-winter Songs* is a collection of works by one of the world's most beloved composers, Morten Lauridsen, who is featured on the piano in collaboration with The Singers. *Tonight, Eternity Alone* and *Splendid Jewel* are collections by René Clausen and Stephen Paulus, respectively. Along with three Christmas albums, a folk song collection, and live concert recordings, The Singers also feature a concert video library on their website.

The Singers and Matthew Culloton host educational events aimed both at students and the community at large. Choral Festivals that bring together students from around the region have been held to honor Morten Lauridsen and René Clausen, and school classroom visits and masterclasses are a frequent offering. In 1998 he married Susan Weatherford, a poet, musician, avid gardener, and graduate of Berea College and University of Kentucky. They have one son, Jess.

Ordained a priest in 2002, Cole served as vicar at Church of the Advocate, a worshiping community of the Diocese of Western North Carolina for homeless in downtown Asheville, North Carolina. From 2005 to 2012, Cole was sub-dean at The Cathedral of All Souls in Asheville. He served as rector at The Church of the Good Shepherd in Lexington, Kentucky, from 2012 until his election as bishop.

Cole has served as an instructor in Appalachian Religion, Faith and Practices, and Appalachian Religion and Culture, at Warren Wilson College, Swannanoa. NC; Wake Forest University School of Divinity in Winston-Salem, NC, and Luther Seminary, St. Paul, Minn. Prior to his ordination as a priest, he served for seven years on the staff of the Appalachian Ministries Education Resource Center (AMERC) in Berea, Kentucky. Much of his work then involved teaching seminarians, listening to Appalachian leaders, both in and out of the Church, and learning how to read and appreciate the culture of the region.

He served on the Executive Council of The Episcopal Church 2006-2012 and on the Executive Committee of the Executive Council 2009-2012. He has chaired, facilitated, led, co-led and participated in numerous committees, training programs advisory boards, and retreats. Cole has twice served as a General Convention deputy – in 2006 and 2009. He is an associate of the Order of the Holy Cross.

Cole is an avid reader and runner, and loves listening to good jazz music. He ran the San Francisco Marathon in 2000 and ran the Shut-in Bridge Run in 2006 and 2008, which is considered to be the toughest trail race in the southeastern United States. The Bluegrass 10K is a road race routed directly by Good Shepherd and Cole ran it annually while living in Lexington.

The Venerable Paul Sneve is Archdeacon of the Episcopal Diocese of South Dakota. He is the Vicar of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Vermillion, South Dakota. In 2018, Archdeacon Sneve oversaw the translation process of the

Lakota translation of the Book of Common Prayer. He will preach at the Conference's Opening Eucharist as well as give a keynote address "The Episcopal Church and Indigenous Ministries in Minnesota & the Dakotas".

Award-winning Canadian-American musician Maxine **Thévenot** is known for her skillful, musical playing, inventive concert programming, and passionate, informed conducting. She combines a commitment to her liturgical work as a cathedral musician with guest conducting, and solo and collaborative organ recitals. Maxine is Director of Cathedral Music & Organist at the Cathedral of St. John in the Diocese of the Rio Grande, Albuquerque, New Mexico. Dr. Thévenot is the Artistic Director of the cathedral's Friends of Cathedral Music community outreach series. Additionally, she is the Founding and Artistic Director of Polyphony: Voices of New Mexico, the state's first resident professional vocal ensemble. Adjunct instructor of organ at the University of New Mexico, she is also an organist for the Alumni Chapel on campus. She serves as an examiner for the American Guild of Organists and on the editorial board of the Association of Anglican Musicians.

Melanie Ohnstad has been a church musician since her graduation from St. Olaf College. She led the music ministries of St. Stephen Lutheran Church, Wausau, WI, Trinity Episcopal Cathedral, Phoenix, AZ, and Westminster Presbyterian Church, Minneapolis. During her Arizona years she earned a Master of Music degree at Arizona State University studying organ with David N. Johnson. She played multiple concerts with the Phoenix Symphony birthing a lifelong love of collaborative music making. When Melanie moved back to the Midwest she enjoyed over a decade as an assistant organist to Howard Don Small at St. Mark's Cathedral, Minneapolis, and participated frequently in the nationally acclaimed St. Mark's Music Series.

Melanie advanced her organ playing through a DMA with Dean Billmeyer at the University of Minnesota and is ever grateful for a sabbatical spent taking lessons with Rachel Laurin in Ottawa. Melanie has accompanied Minnesota choirs on three separate European tours and has made multiple recordings with Twin Cities choral ensembles. She has served as dean of the TCAGO chapter and is currently on its board.

Melanie was named Minister of Music and the Arts Emerita during her retirement celebrations at Westminster where her tenure included the installation of a Dobson organ, growth of the church's musical ensembles and community partnerships, and the introduction of new worship styles and global repertoire. Melanie is now freelancing as an organist, expanding her culinary explorations, and enjoying more time in hiking boots and cross country skis. She and her husband travel frequently and are delighted by more regular visits with kids and grands in CA and CO.

The Cathedral of St. Mark began life in 1858 as a north Minneapolis mission of Gethsemane Church and by 1870, the parish had built a church on 6th Street, which was occupied until 1908. During St. Mark's first fifty years, membership grew rapidly, as did the commercial area around it. Its programs

served not only the congregation but also the neighborhood. However, encroaching commerce began to drive many neighborhood members away from town and toward the suburbs of Loring Park and the lakes. Fewer people were left to pay the church's increasing bills. Parish resources were further depleted in 1880 when 150 members left after a dispute over finances and church politics and founded St. Paul's Church. By then, St. Mark's building was in need of major repairs, and its neighborhood crowded with streetcar traffic, stable smells, and general commotion had become more dangerous and less appealing.

Into these circumstances stepped Bishop Samuel Cook Edsall (also acting Rector of St. Mark's from 1903-1907). He was determined not only to save the floundering parish but to transform it into something it had never imagined becoming, a great new cathedral for the Diocese of Minnesota. His dream became a possibility when downtown property values skyrocketed.

To design the "new" St. Mark's, the Vestry chose parishioner Edwin Hawley Hewitt as architect. Trained in Europe as well as in the United States, Hewitt envisioned a neo-Gothic design. Positioned on a hilltop overlooking the park and facing the city, Saint Mark's may have not been a cathedral yet, but it certainly looked like one. New members were quickly drawn to join the congregation, and within five years of its opening in 1910, the church had over 1000 members on the rolls.

St. Mark's designation as Cathedral came in 1941, on the eve of America's entry into World War II. There have been many highlights in its history since then, including the convening of the First World Anglican Congress in 1954. The Cathedral was a focal point of the Episcopal Church's historic 1976 General Convention in Minneapolis, during which women were first officially accepted for ordination to the priesthood and the current Book of Common Prayer was adopted. St. Mark's also hosted the Conference of North American Deans in 1991. The General Convention came to Minneapolis a third time in 2003, with its landmark ratification of Gene Robinson as the church's first openly gay bishop. His return here in June 2013, directly after the Minnesota and Supreme Court rulings on gay marriage, was a highlight of celebrations throughout the community.

St Mark's Cathedral has long been known for its various music programs and concerts. It has since 1910 seen six Directors of Music. The first organ in the current church was an 1871 E & G.G. Hook, moved from the previous building. In 1928 Welte installed a four manual instrument, designed by Charles Courboin. The organ survived a number of rebuilds and additions as musical tastes changed throughout the 20th century. In 2012, Foley-Baker Inc. completed a major redesign and rebuild of the organ, replacing one third of the pipework, restoring some original Welte ranks that earlier had been removed, and relocating ranks from the gallery to the main organ.







Julie Amacher's desire to introduce others to great music is what led her to radio. She began her professional broadcast career at a station in Sun Prairie, Wis. She went from rock 'n' roll to the Rocky Mountains, where she found her niche in public radio at KUNC in Greeley, Colo. Julie spent 13 years at KUNC, where she managed the announcers and their eclectic music format. During that time, she earned four national awards for best announcer. She joined Minnesota Public Radio in 1997 as an on-air host and also produces New Classical Tracks, a weekly podcast critiquing a new release each week. It airs locally at 7:15 a.m. Wednesdays and 5:15 p.m. Fridays.

Carol Barnett creates audacious and engaging music, both for traditional instrumentation, and for cross-pollinations such as a mass accompanied by a bluegrass band or a duet for steel pan and organ. A force in the Minnesota music scene since 1970, her work has been funded by multiple regional and national organizations, and published through major houses. Carol is a charter member of the American Composers Forum and a graduate of the University of Minnesota. She was composer in residence with the Dale Warland Singers from 1992 to 2001, and taught composition at Augsburg College from 2000 to 2015.

Linda Kachelmeier (Saint Paul, Minnesota, USA) is a composer, conductor, and professional singer with a special passion for choral music and art song for their capacity for conveying emotion through the human voice. Her music has been described as having "luscious counterpoint, deliberate dissonances, and assertive vocal interaction." She has received

numerous grants and commissions and in 2017 she was awarded the prestigious McKnight Fellowship for Composition. Linda's music has been performed by professional ensembles such as VocalEssence and The Rose Ensemble, as well as many school and church choirs across the United States and Europe. She is the founder and artistic director of the women's vocal quartet LUMINA. Since 1991 she has been the Director of Music at First Presbyterian Church in South St. Paul. Her vast experience as a singer and conductor has helped make her a uniquely sensitive and gifted composer when writing for the voice, from children's choirs to professional singers and all levels in between.

Named by *The Guardian* as a composer "who will enrich your life," Shruthi Rajasekar is an Indian-American musician who explores identity, community, and joy. A 2023 Jerome Hill Artist Fellow, Shruthi draws from her unique dual background in the Carnatic (South Indian classical) and Western classical traditions to create intersectional music. She was awarded the Global Women in Music Award from the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights & Donne in Musica Adkins Chiti Foundation. Shruthi has been an Artist-in-Residence at Tusen Takk Foundation, Britten Pears Arts, and the Anderson Center. As a soprano and Carnatic vocalist, Shruthi has performed and recorded in numerous traditional and experimental settings. She was a Marshall Scholar in the UK, where she pursued postgraduate studies in composition and ethnomusicology. A graduate of Princeton University, Shruthi lives in Minnesota and serves on the board of new music chamber ensemble Zeitgeist.

Abraham Wallace is a doctoral student at the University of Michigan studying Pipe Organ Performance and Sacred Music. He holds degrees from Yale University (MM: Pipe Organ Performance) and the University of Oklahoma (BMA: Piano, BS: Geophysics). From 2021-2023, he was the Edwards Organ Scholar at St. John's Episcopal Church in Detroit, MI. He is currently serving as Organ Scholar at St. George's Episcopal Church in Nashville, TN under the auspices of the AAM's Gerre Hancock Internship. In his spare time, he enjoys baking bread and making coffee.

The corner of Second Avenue South and Eighth Street has long been a site for worship in downtown Minneapolis. In 1876, just nine years after Minneapolis was incorporated as a city, the Universalist Society chose this corner to build their church.

The Church of the Redeemer became the spiritual home to many of the city's most distinguished citizens, including William Washburn, Charles Loring, Alonzo Rand and John Crosby. Twelve years after the church was built, it was destroyed by fire. Construction of a new church began immediately, and the second Church of the Redeemer was dedicated in 1889. It served as a spiritual home for the Universalist Society until 1941 when, because of dwindling membership, it was sold to the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis. After extensive remodeling in both the upper and lower levels, it was dedicated as **Saint Olaf Catholic Church** on June 1, 1941. The name, Saint Olaf, commemorating the eleventh century warrior-saint, was chosen because of the city's large Scandinavian population. Twelve years after Saint Olaf was dedicated, history repeated itself: the church building was again destroyed by fire on Ash Wednesday, February 18, 1953. The new and present Saint

Olaf was rebuilt and reopened on Ash Wednesday, February 23, 1955.

In architectural style, the new Saint Olaf has little in common with the old. It was built in contemporary design, a bold move at the time but one that has been validated repeatedly, especially after the Second Vatican Council.

Since the early seventies, Saint Olaf has served the poor of the area through an extensive social outreach program. In 1980, the lot adjacent to the church was purchased to provide room for building expansion and parking. The Chapel of Saints John and Paul was a major addition in 1980.

In 1990, a parish center was built which has allowed Saint Olaf to become a leader in parish education, programming, and spiritual formation. In 1995, Saint Olaf purchased the Exodus Hotel to its south, a transitional housing facility for residents who would otherwise be without a safe, clean place to stay. It is likely that Saint Olaf is the only church in the nation that is connected to a major city's skyway system.

In 2000, the sanctuary of the church underwent extensive renovation, and the Lively-Fulcher organ was completed in July 2001.

The instrument has 61 stops and 67 ranks (49 independent registers) playable over five divisions, Grand Orgue, Récit Expressif, Positif Expressif, Bombarde and Pedale. The manual and pedal key actions make use of electric slider windchests and the wind supply is regulated by a traditional bellows system linked to the wind chests by wooden wind lines. The console is built in a low profile, curved jamb configuration to enhance the organist's ability to follow the Liturgy and conduct the choir. The console has natural keys covered in bone and sharp keys of solid ebony.

The internal layout of the divisions within the organ case places the Positif Expressif centrally in the lower middle of the case and the Grand Orgue above that with the Récit Expressif behind the Grand Orgue. The Bombarde reeds are located in the Positif box and the Pedale division is divided on either side of the manuals and behind the 16-foot Pedal towers in the case.

The casework, constructed of African mahogany, takes its inspiration from the contemporary architecture of the room and has simple Scandinavian design elements yet a firm traditional layout. The façade pipes are made of 72% tin and include pipes from the Grand Orgue Montre 16', Montre 8' and Pedal Montre 8'.

The organ is completely housed within its own freestanding casework and because of the deep gallery around three sides of the room is positioned at the front center of the church to enable it to fill the room with sound. A Cymbelstern stop - a group of small bells - is provided on the instrument and the church's tower bells can be played from the Récit keyboard.

The design of the pipe shades for the instrument is tied to the rich traditions associated with St. Olaf. They are made of basswood with patterns of dragons, eagles and serpents which are found in the Book of Kells. These designs are slightly earlier than King Olaf's time, but they are strong Scandinavian symbols from the period. The cross piercing the crown is based on an 8th century piece made for St. Rupert.



David Cherwien holds an undergraduate degree in Choral Music Education and Organ Performance from Augsburg College (Minneapolis, MN). He has a MA in Theory and Composition and a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Organ Performance from the University of Minnesota. He spent two years studying conducting, composition and organ at the Berlin Church Music School.

Cherwien currently serves as Cantor at Mount Olive Lutheran Church in Minneapolis as well as past Artistic Director of the National Lutheran Choir. He also serves as editor for the National Lutheran Choir Series of choral music. In 2000, he was awarded "Distinguished Alumnus" by Augsburg College. He is the 2007 award winner of the Raabe Prize for Excellence in Sacred Composition for his piece, "The Souls of the Righteous."

Convinced that worshiping in English would draw more people to Lutheranism, a group of 40 German Americans established an English-language mission church in south Minneapolis. In 1909 it became **Mount Olive Lutheran Church**.

Although the congregation became a part of the conservative Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, it retained a progressive outlook that later proved important to its story.

Almost immediately, the new congregation purchased property at 31st Street and Chicago Avenue and began constructing its first home. In 1921, The Reverend Theo. H. Schroedel became pastor and, over the next four decades, built the congregation into a force in the synod and community. Construction on a larger church was finished in 1931. That church stands today.

Like many mainline congregations, Mount Olive grew rapidly in the postwar years. An education and office wing were added in 1957. Schroedel, meanwhile, emerged as a leader in a national movement to liberalize the Missouri Synod, and Paul Manz, Mount Olive's first cantor, drew worldwide attention for his compositions, organ improvisations, and innovations in congregational singing.

The arrival of The Reverend Alton Wedel in 1961 led Mount Olive deeper into the social ministry and ecumenical movements of the 1960s. Finally, in 1976, came a dramatic split: Mount Olive ended its 67-year relationship with the Missouri Synod, leading eventually to its joining the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), North America's largest Lutheran body, formed in 1988.

In recent decades, Mount Olive has continued to sharpen its focus: In the 1980s and '90s, Cantor Mark Sedio, along with The Reverend Mark Wegner and Neighborhood Ministries Coordinator Donna Neste, strengthened the parish's commitment to liturgical worship and social outreach.

Starting in 1998, The Reverend William Heisley broadened the congregation's appreciation of various liturgical traditions, including those of the Orthodox churches.

With the arrival of Cantor David Cherwien in 2001, Pastor Joseph Crippen in 2010, and neighborhood outreach coordinator Anna Scott in 2014, the parish further committed itself to musical innovation, excellence in preaching, and a renewed emphasis on social justice.

Designed and installed in a rear gallery in the mid 1960s by Herman Schlicker in consultation with Paul Manz, Mount Olive's organ broke new ground for its time. The organ has 39 independent registers and 55 ranks of pipes. The Pedal organ is on either side of the façade, with its largest pipes adorning the façade itself. The Swell organ (Manual III), under expression, is in the center, and the Great organ (Manual II) is placed on top of it. The "Trompeta Real", with its copper resonators, runs horizontally from the center of the organ. The Positiv (Manual I) cantilevers from the gallery rail. An Antiphonal organ is placed near the front of the nave.

Resounding Voices and the Women's Sacred Music Project

The Women's Sacred Music Project is a non-profit organization founded in Philadelphia in 1995 to diversify the music of our sacred liturgies (both Christian and Jewish) by including the voices of women. It sprang from the imagination of Lisa Neufeld Thomas, a parishioner at St. Mark's Church

in downtown Philadelphia, and the determined advocacy of The Right Reverend Allen Bartlett, the Episcopal Bishop of Pennsylvania. In 1997, with the sponsorship of bishops Allen Bartlett, Barbara Harris, Frank Griswold, and John Howe, the General Convention passed a resolution calling for a supplement to *The Hymnal 1982*. The supplement was to emphasize liturgical music, hymns and other songs by women, celebrating the contributions and diversity of women in scripture, women saints, and churchwomen. \$25,000 was budgeted for the project, although the funding was not appropriated.

The Board of Directors of the Women's Sacred Music Project proceeded as agents for the Standing Commission on Church Music in compiling the hymnal, and in 2003 Voices Found was published.

For the 20th anniversary of *Voices Found*, the WSMP decided to honor Lisa Neufeld Thomas's work by issuing a Call for Hymns. We had no budget, little experience, and no clear vision of what we were after. The Call went out January 1, 2023 and over 200 submissions poured in. We applied for and received \$19,000 in grants. We labored and voted and vigorously debated what it was we were after.

Finally, we decided to throw caution to the wind and search for hymns and songs that spoke to a variety of musical styles and spiritualities. Resounding Voices was published online on December 14, 2023, just one year from the beginning of the

project. Although only half the size of Voices Found, Resounding Voices captures its innovative spirit.

The Reverend Dr. Janet Wootton is past president of The Hymn Society of Great Britain and Ireland. She provided us with concrete advice and heartfelt encouragement. She also wrote the beautiful introduction to Resounding Voices. She said that challenges to patriarchal norms would lead to tectonic shifts in language and thought. "The solid ground of old certainty begins to break up, and new vistas resound with joy and hope, that the world can be different, and call us to action, to be participants, even agents in this new world."

ST. PHILIP THE APOSTLE CATHOLIC CHURCH Flower Mound, Texas

St. Philip's is home to 3200 families, located in one of the fastest-growing areas of the country. Things didn't start out that way. . . The fledgling congregation held its first mass in November 1967, built their first church in 1971, followed by larger churches in 1977 & 1997. Within two decades the parish had outgrown their thind building. Phase 1 of a new parish campus, including the 800-seat rear half of the church nave was completed in 2022. Future plans include a 1000-seat Phase 2 parish hall plus completion of the church to add up to 1000 more seats.

We were delighted to find a pastor who embraced time-honored building forms and championed traditional Catholic liturgical music led by choir and organ. A generous natural acoustic to support liturgy and congregational singing was an essential component. The architects brought a solid understanding of historic church design as viewed through a 21st-Century aesthetic lens, and employed practical, affordable, modern construction techniques to realize an excellent compromise of the many competing architectural, engineering, liturgical, acoustical, musical and spoken word requirements.

The scale of this *parish* church is vast, even at half its final size: 95' long x 75' wide x 78' high. Walls are built up from multiple layers of cement board and dense drywall. The organ chamber has four total layers on heavy gauge steel framing isolated from adjacent offices. 3" thick laminated tongue & groove southern pine is used

for the exposed roof deck. The floor is polished concrete, and the walnut pews have no pads. Full bandwidth reverberance exceeds 5 seconds (unoccupied). Phase 1 of a new balcony organ was completed by Casavant in 2023. We also designed a speech-reinforcement sound system for intelligi-bility of the spoken word from the sanctuary, plus balcony voice-amplification for cantors. Now, St. Philip's can really grow!

Founded in 1988 by Axel Theimer, and now led by Adam Reinwald, **Kantorei** is one of the premier choral ensembles in Minnesota. With an integral focus on vocal health, Kantorei's singers have set a standard in Minnesota for rich and effortless choral sound. Kantorei performs a wide range of mostly *a capella* music from around the world by both well-known and emerging composers.

Kantorei performs primarily in Minnesota and shares recordings worldwide. Through its outreach programming, Kantorei invites audiences of all ages to share its pursuit of singing for a lifetime.

Growing up in Oak Park, Illinois, **Madeleine Woodworth** studied piano with Dr. Sally Sloane and organ with Dr. Dennis Northway, and she participated in church choirs directed by Dr. Northway. She currently serves as the Director of Music at Grace Episcopal Church in Oak Park and enjoys her role as staff accompanist at the Merit School of Music. She pursues her passion for small choral ensembles by singing in the William Ferris Chorale and in La Caccina, a nine-voice professional treble ensemble. In her current work, she values the representation of minority and living composers and authors.

Madeleine earned her Bachelor of Music in Organ Performance at the Eastman School of Music under the tutelage of Nathan Laube. During her time there, she won first prize in the American Guild of Organists' Regional Competition for Young Organists (Great Lakes Chapter) and the Westchester Organ Competition. Her interest in new music led her to collaborate with Wilhelmina Esary, to premiere a new piece for the organ called "On Track" as part of the AGO's Student Commissioning Project. Madeleine participated in Eastman's student government and was inducted into the music fraternity, Sigma Alpha Iota.

Along with her church choir background, her involvement in choirs at Eastman led her to pursue her Master of Music in Choral Conducting at the Yale School of Music and Yale Institute of Sacred Music where she studied with Marguerite Brooks, Dr. Jeffrey Douma, and David Hill. Upon graduation, she was awarded the Robert Shaw Prize for excellence in conducting and the Richard Paul DeLong Prize in church music. Her favorite international professional experiences include the Yale Schola Cantorum's tour to Scandinavia, the Yale study exchange with Zurich University of the Arts in Switzerland, and the Lisbon Choral Conducting Masterclass in Portugal. Most recently, she was a featured performer in the North Shore American Guild of Organists Regional Convention and enjoyed singing with Nova Era Vocal Ensemble (Lisbon-based) in summer 2023.

Gloria Dei Lutheran Church, an ELCA congregation, was founded on June 4, 1908 as a mission congregation of First Lutheran Church, the first Lutheran congregation to take root in Minnesota territory. Originally located in a small church building on Victoria and Hague in St. Paul, the church moved to its current location at Snelling and Highland Parkway in 1951. Although Clarence Johnston, the famous and prolific St. Paul architect, was deceased some fifteen years before the current church was constructed, his firm were the architects for the current church.

In 2023, Létourneau Pipe Organs completed Opus 137 for Gloria Dei Lutheran Church, comprising 59 stops, 60 ranks, and 3,591 pipes over three manuals and pedal. The instrument includes pipework from earlier instruments by Casavant Frères and M. P. Möller, combined with new pipework by Létourneau.

The organ was delivered to the church in late October of 2022 and was installed in collaboration with the Organ Clearing House.

Anglicans and Benedictines

If we remember that, by tradition, Saint Augustine, the sixth-century Benedictine missionary who brought Christianity to the British Isles also founded the first Cathedral choir school at Canterbury, one can make a good case for the inextricable link between Benedictinism and the English Cathedral choral tradition. In fact, English Christianity was profoundly influenced by Benedictine monasticism in the Middle Ages. The Benedictine revival in the 19th century shared many ideas with the parallel catholic revival in the Anglican Church known as the Oxford Movement.

In Minnesota, the connection between Benedictines and Anglicans is particularly tangible. The community at Collegeville has long had an effect on liturgical practice and scholarship in this area. Many liturgical innovations and historic reclamations can be traced to Saint John's Abbey. The construction of the new Breuer Abbey Church, an extremely radical design for its pre-Vatican day, is testimony to the liturgical sensitivity and forethought of this community.

In the 1930s, the writings of Virgil Michel, a member of the Saint John's Community, fired much debate on the subjects of liturgy and justice throughout the American Church. It is only now that much of Michel's work is being appreciated for its applicability, both within the Roman and Anglican Churches.

In 1981 a unique relationship was established between the community of Saint John's and the Episcopal Diocese of Minnesota when The Right Reverend William Dimmock, then Assistant Bishop of Minnesota, was received "in residence" at Saint John's. It was the first time an Anglican bishop had ever been welcomed as part of a Roman Catholic community in an official way. Bishop Dimmock, while serving the Episcopal needs of northern Minnesota, lived at the abbey, taught as guest lecturer in history and theology in the university, and conducted many seminars in the seminary and the Ecumenical Institute.

The Episcopal Diocese of Minnesota and Saint John's Abbey continues to serve as an active model of ecumenism, even at a time when ecumenism has gone out of fashion in many sectors. The crowning achievement of this cooperative relationship is the Episcopal House of Prayer, a permanent reminder of the Benedictine tenet of hospitality, and a strong symbol of Christian unity.

"Ecumenism is scriptural, and is ordained of God" stated Dimmock in 1982. "We learn from the Bible that it is the way that God intends things to be forever and ever. If unity is God's will, then it behooves us to live in accordance with his eternal will. The vision of unity is a gift of God."

A History of Saint John's Abbey

In 1856, shortly after the Minnesota Territory was opened up for settlement, five Benedictine monks left Saint Vincent's Abbey in Latrobe, Pennsylvania, to found a monastery to serve the early German settlers in central Minnesota. Uncertainty over the title to their land in Saint Cloud forced them to move, and they eventually came to settle in a beautiful wooded area between Lake Sagatagan and the Watab Creek where Saint John's Abbey stands today.

In 1857 the Benedictines received the charter for a school for young men where history, English, German, Latin, Greek, astronomy, rhetoric and mathematics were taught. Aided by ordained monks sent from the East and by hastily trained recruits, priests from the abbey also ministered to the scattered settlers. By 1860 they were serving more than fifty parish communities in central Minnesota. By the time the first bishop was appointed to northern Minnesota in 1875, a number of monks were already assigned as resident pastors of Minnesota parishes.

In 1896 Saint John's Abbey established two new monasteries in frontier territory and expanded its ministry to the Indian reservations in northern Minnesota. The following year a high school and the School of Divinity were established.

During the tenure of Abbott Peter Engel (1895-1921), a number of college buildings took shape: observatory, library, gymnasium, kitchen, infirmary, science hall, and dormitory (Benet Hall). The next abbott, Alcuin Deutsch (1921-1950), is credited with recognizing the significance of the liturgical movement in Europe and making Saint John's a center of the movement in this country: Alcuin approved the founding of The Liturgical Press in 1926.

In the missionary zeal of the late 1940s the Abbey began new foundations in The Bahamas, Kentucky, Mexico, Puerto Rico, and Japan. By 1946 Saint John's Abbey had become a very large community with 251 members, 186 of them priests.

By the time of Alcuin's retirement in 1950 the question facing Saint John's was how large the college should become. Under his successor, Baldwin Dworschak (1950-1971) it became evident that something had to be done about the pressures of growth in both the monastic community and the college. No longer could the entire Saint John's community worship or gather in one space. With consultation, Baldwin made major decisions that would permanently change Saint John's.

The Hungarian-German modernist architect Marcel Breuer was eventually chosen to design a comprehensive plan for the campus. Once this plan was approved in 1953, Breuer was commissioned to design a new wing for the monastery, and was subsequently commissioned to draw up working plans for the church. The new church would seat as many as 200 monks in choir and 1,650 college students at daily Mass, plus as many as 400 preparatory students in a downstairs chapel. At the same time Breuer designed the 400-bed dormitory, St. Thomas Aquinas Hall.

The dorm was completed in 1959, and the church in 1961.

Other Breuer buildings would follow: Alcuin Library (1964); Peter Engel Science Hall (1965); Saints Bernard, Boniface, and Patrick college residence halls (1967); and the residential complex of the newly formed Institute for Ecumenical and Cultural Research (1968) on its own campus in Flynntown.

By the early 1960s, the number of monks belonging to Saint John's Abbey was approaching 400, college enrollment exceeded 1,000, and the Prep School numbered well over 300. Abbott Baldwin attended the third and fourth sessions of Vatican II, and Saint John's was also represented at the Council by Father Godfrey Diekmann, who served as a peritus for the document on the liturgy.

The number of Saint John's monks peaked at 404 in 1963. In the next decades this number gradually declined as the foundations in the Bahamas, Puerto Rico, and Mexico achieved independent status, the number of young men applying to enter the monastery dwindled, and some professed monks either chose not to make final vows or sought exclaustration and left the community.

The years following Vatican II (1962-1965) were a period of change. Father Colman Barry became president in 1964. During his tenure Colman founded the Hill Monastic Manuscript Library in 1965, the Phillips faculty position in Jewish Studies in 1969, and Minnesota Educational Radio in 1967. He supported the Institute for Ecumenical and Cultural Research founded by Father Kilian McDonnell in 1968, as well as adoption of a single academic calendar and curriculum for Saint John's University and the College of Saint Benedict, which was the essential first step toward close cooperation between the colleges.

Abbot Baldwin resigned in 1971, and Father John Eidenschink, canonist on the seminary faculty and longtime subprior, was elected abbot and served until 1979. Father Colman also resigned in 1971, to be succeeded by Father Michael Blecker as university president.

This period saw changes in lifestyle in the abbey. Father Jerome Theisen was elected abbot in 1979 and served until he was elected Abbot Primate in 1992. A new pattern of community life evolved during the years he and Abbot John Eidenschink held office. Shifting from Latin to English for the Eucharist and Divine Office was a multi-stage change. The current seven-volume loose-leaf version of the Office in English was worked out starting in 1983. Hymns took the place of Gregorian chant, and devotions like Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, novenas, the Angelus, and Stations of the Cross became less frequent. The hour for Morning Prayer went from 4:45 to 7:00 a.m., and nocturnal silence yielded to academic and social activity, evening television, and events off campus.

Deeper changes also took place. Vatican II emphasized the communal character of the Eucharist. As a result, private celebration of Mass was frowned upon. Priests were encouraged to concelebrate at the daily conventual Mass around the single altar upstairs, its free-standing central location reflecting the liturgical thinking of Vatican II.

By the 1990s, Saint John's Abbey was still the largest Benedictine monastic community in the world, supporting a university of 1800 undergraduates, and 200 graduate students and seminarians. Abbot Timothy Kelly was elected when Jerome Theisen went to Rome as Abbot Primate in 1992. By now new entrants to the community had slowed to a trickle, and the number of monks available for parish ministry sharply declined. By agreement with the bishop, the abbey resigned its title to pastorates in perpetuity and gradually withdrew from parishes founded by the monks more than a century earlier.

Saint John's Abbey has historically maintained close ties with the Episcopal Church in Minnesota. These ties are evidenced by a number of Anglicans serving prominent faculty posts at the University, and by the number of existing programs which encourage Episcopalians to share in the vast resources of the abbey and university. This special cooperative relationship was put into specific focus with the 1990 completion and dedication of the Episcopal House of Prayer, the first such facility ever built within the confines of a Roman Catholic monastic community.

In 2012 the seven-volume Saint John's Bible was completed, with the formal presentation of the New Testament Letters and Book of Revelation by Donald and Mabel Jackson to Abbot John Klassen and Father Bob Koopmann, president of Saint John's University. The Saint John's Bible is exhibited in its own state-of-the-art gallery in the lower level of the newly renovated Alcuin Library.





Fr. Anthony Ruff, OSB is a monk and priest of St. John's Abbey. He teaches theology, liturgical music, and Gregorian chant. He has masters degrees from St. John's and Yale University, and he earned his doctorate in liturgy from the University of Graz, Austria. He has studied organ with Kim Kasling, Thomas Murray, and Peter Planyavsky. He is the founding director of the National Catholic Youth Choir, a summer camp and touring experience at St. John's for high-school singers. He served on the music subcommittee of the national Bishops' Committee on the Liturgy that drafted the 2007 document of the US bishops Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship. He was chair of the committee which wrote the

English chant melodies for the 2011 Roman Missal for all the English-speaking countries. He has served on the board of the National Association of Pastoral Musicians and the leadership team of the Catholic Academy of Liturgy, and he has served on the executive committee of the Hymn Society. He is a frequent presenter across the U.S. and internationally on topics of liturgy and music, he serves as English-German translator for the Internationale Arbeitsgemeinschaft für Hymnologie, and he frequently publishes in liturgical and musical journals. He plays organ and directs Gregorian chant at the abbey. He is moderator of the popular liturgy blog "Pray Tell."

She has appeared in recital throughout Europe, Oman, Australia, New Zealand, the United States, and Canada, including at the Cathedrals of Cologne and Regensburg (Germany); the ElbPhilharmonie (Hamburg); the Royal Festival Hall, St. Paul's Cathedral, Westminster Cathedral, and Westminster Abbey (London); City Hall (Stockholm); the Royal Opera House of Muscat (Oman); the Forbidden City Concert Hall (Beijing, China); Victoria Hall (Singapore); Melbourne Town Hall (Australia); Auckland Town Hall (New Zealand); Disney Hall (Los Angeles); Davies Hall (San Francisco); the Meyerson Symphony Center (Dallas); the Kimmel Center,

and the Wanamaker Organ at Macy's (Philadelphia); and the Maison Symphonique (Montréal).

Dr. Demers is in continual high demand by her colleagues as witnessed by performances for numerous regional and national conventions of the American Guild of Organists, the Institute of Organ Builders and International Society of Organbuilders, the Royal Canadian College of Organists, and the Organ Historical Society. She has released multiple CD recordings on the Acis and Pro Organo labels. Her latest CD, recorded at Chicago's Rockefeller Chapel, was released in January 2020, and includes works of Reger, Laurin, Dupré, Mendelssohn, Tchaikovsky, and Macmillan.

A native of Québec and a doctoral graduate of the Juilliard School, Dr. Demers is Associate Professor of Organ at McGill University (Montréal, Québec). She was formerly the Joyce


Bowden Chair in Organ and Head of the Organ Program at Baylor University (Waco, Texas).

Area Chair and Associate Professor of Organ **Dr. Damin Spritzer** has been with the University of Oklahoma since 2014. Formerly Adjunct Professor at the University of North Texas teaching Organ Literature and Sacred Music, she continues work with the Cathedral Church of Saint Matthew in Dallas as Artist-in-Residence for Cathedral Arts. For the Organ Historical Society, she serves on the Library Archives Committee, and for the Association of Anglican Musicians, on their editorial board. Previously she has participated with the Board of Directors for the Leupold Foundation, dedicated to the preservation of pipe organ music and culture, and is active in the Dallas and Oklahoma City Chapters of the American Guild of Organists.

SEEKING ASSISTANCE FROM THE PCDC - A GUIDE

The Professional Concerns and Development Committee welcomes engagement with AAM members at anytime when assistance is needed. We encourage a proactive approach in dealing with working relationships and conflict in parish ministry. The earlier one contacts the PCDC, the more of a chance there is that concrete help can be offered. The following chart is intended to identify possible steps in the work between PCDC and AAM members, based on when AAM members first contact the PCDC.

While the PCDC and Chancellor do not represent either AAM or its individual members as counsel, the PCDC and Chancellor aid members with resources and insight to potential legal and professional ethical issues confronting the organization in pursuit of excellence in art, music and liturgy in the Episcopal Church. Any conversation with the Chancellor does not create an attorney/client privilege, but confidentiality will be maintained.

Track 1: Before an Initial Conversation with Employer/Employee

AAM member contacts a member of the PCDC. If necessary, schedule a second conversation with PCDC member or the entire committee. PCDC listens to the situation at hand and suggests

resources and a possible plan of action for AAM member based on the particular situation.

AAM member schedules a meeting with employer/employee to address concerns, using anything that is helpful from meeting(s) with PCDC and additional resources.

AAM member schedules followup meeting with PCDC member/ committee to evaluate meeting with employer/employee.

Working relationship is resolved and conversations end.

OR

Additional conversation is scheduled with employee/ employer because of ongoing lack of resolution.

6 PCDC member is asked to facilitate a conversation between employer and employee.

If no resolution is achieved, please see Track 3.

7 If issues are resolved, PCDC chair follows up with AAM member in a month to check in.

Track 2: After an Initial Conversation with Employer/Employee

AAM member contacts a member of the PCDC. If needed, a meeting of the entire committee may be called. PCDC

1 listens to the situation at hand and suggests resources and a possible plan of action for employer/employee based on the particular situation.

AAM member schedules a meeting with employer/
employee to address concerns, using anything that is helpful from meeting(s) with PCDC and additional resources.

Working relationship is resolved and conversations end.

OR

Additional conversation is scheduled with employee/ employer because of ongoing lack of resolution.

PCDC member is asked to facilitate a conversation between employer and employee.

If no resolution is achieved, please see Track 3.

6 If issues are resolved, PCDC chair follows up with AAM member in a month to check in.

Track 3: After Termination of a Working Relationship

AAM member contacts a member of the PCDC. There is acknowledgment that PCDC cannot change the outcome of

1 the terminated working relationship but can be supportive. PCDC suggests resources for moving forward and healing.

AAM member schedules followup meeting with PCDC member or committee.

PCDC checks in with AAM member a month after final conversation to evaluate progress.

If needed, further conversation takes place or additional resources are suggested.


The Second Lesson Colossians 1:15-20

The Reverend Craig Peter Lemming is a consummate learner, teacher and leader whose ministry focuses on continuing the legacies of the late Archbishop Desmond Tutu and The Reverend Pauli Murray, among others. Fr. Craig is committed to advancing the work of anti-racism, decolonization, and justice and equity for all, and is passionate and compassionate about building community, cultivating love and empowering young leaders.

Fr. Craig was born and raised in Harare, Zimbabwe. In 2001, he moved to the United States to study music, obtaining a Bachelor of Music degree from New England Conservatory of Music and a Master of Music degree from Indiana University. It wasn't until 2013 that he entered United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities for his Master of Divinity degree. He was ordained a Transitional Deacon in 2015, and ordained a Priest in 2017. Since then, Fr. Craig has served as the Associate Rector of St. John the Evangelist Episcopal Church in Saint Paul, Minnesota, and Vice-Chair of the Board for Circle of the Beloved. He recently joined the Diocese of the Episcopal Church in Minnesota's inaugural Racial Justice & Healing Formation Team.

In May 2021, amid the COVID-19 pandemic, Fr. Craig started his doctoral studies—Doctor of Ministry (which is designed to allow students to remain working in their ministry base while they complete their degree)—with the Faculty of Divinity at Trinity College University of Toronto.

Richard Gray has served as the Director of Music and Organist for St. John the Evangelist Episcopal Church, St. Paul, MN, since the Fall of 2018. He is Artistic Director of the church's Winifred Bean Sacred Music Series and coordinator of the choral compline ministry. He is currently preparing the choir for its first UK Choral Evensong Residency at both Canterbury and St. Albans Cathedrals in July of 2024.

Richard has held positions on the music staffs of St. George's Episcopal Church, Nashville, where he trained as organ scholar, and Highland Park Presbyterian Church, Dallas, as assisting organist during his graduate music studies. He holds degrees from Southern Methodist University and Oberlin Conservatory of Music. Additional studies and training have been at the McGill Summer Organ Academy, Montréal, the Atlanta Summer Conducting Institute as a Conducting Fellow, the Cambridge Choral Summer Course, and the University of North Texas Conducting Symposium.

He won the Prize for Hymn Playing Excellence in the 2016 William C. Hall Pipe Organ Competition, San Antonio. Richard is an active member of the Twin Cities Chapter of the American Guild of Organists and Association of Anglican Musicians.

Award-winning organist **Dean Billmeyer** announced his retirement from the University of

Minnesota faculty in May 2023 following forty-one years as University Organist and Professor of Music. At the University he taught courses in Counterpoint, Thoroughbass, and Keyboard Skills, as well as Organ and Harpsichord. Dean has appeared as a recitalist and clinician throughout the United States and Western Europe – his numerous awards include prizes in the Dublin International Organ Festival Competitions in 1980 and 1988, and the American Guild of Organists has twice awarded him for the highest scores nationally on the Guild Certification Examinations. He was elected to the Minnesota Music Hall of Fame in 2018, and presently serves as certification coordinator for the Twin Cities Chapter of the AGO.

A long-time member of the Association of Anglican Musicians, Dean's early musical experiences include singing as a chorister in the 50-voice men and boys' choir at St. George's Church in Schenectady, NY. His organ teachers include David Craighead (Eastman School of Music), Robert Anderson (Southern Methodist University), and Michael Radulescu (Hochschule für Musik und Darstellende Kunst, Vienna).

Dean's Double CD recording entitled "Straube Plays Bach" is the only commercially available recording of the nine major Preludes and Fugues and G Minor Fantasia and Fugue on early 20th-century tubular-pneumatic action organs using the idiosyncratic, hyper-Romantic 1913 edition of Karl Straube, the famous organist and cantor of the Leipzig St. Thomas Church. The recording, released by Rondeau Production of Leipzig in 2018, was nominated for the "Preis der Deutschen Schallplattenkritik" as one of the best classical recordings in Germany in that year.

Dean has appeared regularly as organist, harpsichordist, and pianist over the last twenty-four seasons with both the Minnesota Orchestra and St. Paul Chamber Orchestra. He has held the title of Organist-in-Residence at St. John the Evangelist Episcopal Church in St. Paul since 2021.

The Copper Street Brass is the premier brass chamber ensemble in Minnesota and one of only a handful of self-sustaining brass groups in the country. They were founded in 2008 as a professionally trained classical chamber music ensemble with two trumpets, horn, trombone and tuba. They present exclusively their own music, an original blend of musical styles from Mozart to Madonna, in over 35 concerts and 100 outreach services each season.

The group sound has been described by reviewers as "flawless", "polished", and "somewhere between magnificent and exquisite." Their artistic excellence was widely recognized in 2013 when we were chosen as a finalist for the prestigious McKnight Artist Fellowship. Each individual artist is a master of his or her craft.

The six core musicians, Allison Hall, Josh Cameron, Tim Bradley, Alex Wolff, Nick Adragna, and Erik Barsness, have a combined 10 professional music and education degrees and thousands of performances under their belts. The artists have performed with world-renowned classical ensembles like the

Minnesota Orchestra, SPCO, Minnesota Opera, and Malaysian Philharmonic and also have the versatility to perform with jazz/blues groups such as Davina and the Vagabonds and Nooky Jones. These musicians have recorded individually for Prince, Grammy-winner Big Walter Smith, and many other groups.

The Church of St. John the Evangelist held its first service in January 1881 in a chapel at the nearby Dayton Avenue Presbyterian Church. Nearly five months later, the parish constructed their first church, a wooden building that stood on the northeast corner of Ashland and Mackubin Streets. This building was expanded several times and rotated on its site to accommodate the growing congregation. Next to it was erected a granite school building, which still stands. In the early 1890s an attempt was made to purchase property on Summit Avenue on which to construct a new church, but the effort ultimately failed, in part because of the strained economy.

Over the ensuing decades, St. John's attracted many prominent families to its membership, including railroad executives, professionals, businessmen, politicians, and even statesmen, among them Frank B. Kellogg, who served as a U.S. senator and later as secretary of state under President Calvin Coolidge.

In 1895 the congregation engaged architect Cass Gilbert, the architect who designed the present Minnesota state capitol, to erect a temporary stone church on the present site on Kent Street. In 1902, architect Clarence H. Johnston, Sr., a longtime friend of Cass Gilbert's, was hired to add a nave to the south side of the Cass Gilbert building.

Music has played an important role at St. John's from its very beginning. For many years a choir of men and boys, and later a girls choir, led the musical portions of the services, under the direction of such prominent musicians as Emil Oberhoffer, founder of what is now the Minnesota Orchestra, and George H. Fairclough, a prominent organist who also held a faculty appointment at the University of Minnesota.

The church's organ of 30 ranks was installed in 1922 as Op. 371 by the Skinner Organ Company of Boston. M. P. Möller made additions in 1950, and In 2006-2007 the instrument was renovated and expanded by the Schantz Organ Company.

Her training in contemplative practices began at the Shalem Institute in Baltimore, MD, under the direction of Tilden Edwards and Gerald May, and she received her training to be a spiritual director from the Franciscan Spirituality Center in La Crosse, WI. She is Associate Pastor of St. Stephen's Lutheran in Bloomington, MN, a pastor and spiritual director who regularly leads retreats for clergy and laity. She also serves as a clergy coach through the Fairview Clergy Health Center and as a mentor/teacher with the Spiritual Direction Certification Program at the Lutheran Southern Seminary in Columbia, SC.
